

JACKSON TOP PARIS. Teams, Both Unbeaten, Golden Bears Advance Battling for To Final Round of

Mid-State's Spot in Playoff Finals

West - State Grid Playoff

JACKSON, Tenn., Dec. 2-(Spl)-The Golden Bears of Jackson High School rolled over the Grove Blue Devils of Paris on Rothrock Field: 19 to 3, this afternoon to advance a notch nearer the Tennessee state crown.

More than 5,000 persons from throughout the western part of the state came here expecting to see Tury Oman's crack machine easily

weep aside the challange of the Blue Devils and gain the right to meet Memphis Tech for the West Tennessee title next Tuesday.

They saw their dreams come true but not until after the most stubbornly fought battle that has been played on the local field in quite a span. Grove was soundly whipped but the Faris boys were not out-fought, not by a country mile.

The Blue Devils became the first team in this section of the state to score on the Golden Bears this fall. Jackson had rolled up 409 points and had been scored on only by Edison High of Miami, Fla., up to today's hattle. They were laying odds that Paris wouldn't score.

HORNER TAKES CHANCE

Billy Horner, the Blue Devil's crack field general, took a desperate chance early in the second ouarter after Fred Holder, a brilliant center, had recovered a fumble. He called for an attempted field goal from Jackson's 32-yard line after the Blue Devils had made a first down on the 25. He stepped back and calmly booted the ball through the uprights 42 yards away for the first points scored on Jackson by a West Tennessce team since the play-off with Memphis Tech a year ago. A strong wind favored the plucky little Horner.

The Golden Bears, who made 11 first downs to two for Grove, registered their first touchdown late in the opening period. Jimmy Matlock returned a punt 23 yards to the visitors' 30. Then after Matlock, Harry Balkum and Ross Long had made two first downs to put the hall four yards from pay dirt. Long blasted left guard twice in succession for the score. He then place-kicked the extra point, his 48th of the season and his only one in three trials during the afternoon.

FUMBLED PUNT

A fumbled punt, which alert Tommy Smith recovered behind the goal line gave Jackson its second touchdown. That came mid-way the third period. A little later in this quarter. Grove throttled a determined bid 11 yards from the pay

off stripe.

The final score, manufactured in the latter part of the final period. resulted from a beautiful pass by Jimniy Matlock to Captain Harry Balkum. The latter was out in the open at the right side of the field and the Grove team pulled over to the left on a fake running play. He caught the pass, a heave of about 10 yards, and raced 20 yards before reaching the goal. He side stepped three Blue Devils.

Grove never scriously threatened and the only two times it was inside Jackson's 40-yard stripe came

as the result of fumbles

Long, Balkum and Matlock, all seniors, and Dowdell, in the backfield, Harold Coffman, Lafon Boone and Tom Smith, in the line were the leading Bear performers.

Billy Horner, Fred Holder, Captain James Biley, Tommy Horner and Whitey Snow came in for plenty of praise on the Paris side.
